



## Q. What made you decide to become a teacher?

After living in West Africa for seven years in a humanitarian capacity, I returned to Canada and an opportunity opened for me to volunteer with the Northern Distance Learning program at Moose Kerr School in Aklavik. During my second year, after constant reminders from my aunt that as a child I used to gather rocks around me and teach them, I decided that the moment was right to pursue a life-long ambition.

### Q. What do you teach?

I teach Grades 4, 5, 6 Health, Science, and Art and Physical Education Grades 4-12.

## Q. What do you enjoy most about teaching?

I enjoy teaching most when the learners start to realize their potential and start working toward them regardless of the difficulties they are experiencing.

### Q. How do you engage your students?

Accept them as they are and provide opportunities which allows them to express their authentic selves.

## **Professional Development**

**Trent Waterhouse**, Professional Development Coordinator

Welcome back to another exciting school year. I am already receiving applications for funding from teachers eager to register for Fall courses. With that enthusiasm in mind, let's talk Professional Development (PD) - the continuous growth of personal and professional knowledge and expertise that enhances teaching in support of student learning.

As a GNWT NWTTA member you have several options open to you to engage in a broad range of activities that are committed to self-assessment, personal professional renewal and lifelong learning.

## **GNWT Regional PD Funds**

Each GNWT NWTTA region of the NWT has Regional Professional Development funds to support PD for the NWTTA members in that region. This funding is for individual, school-based or regional PD activities. Each region is unique and has their own policies and procedures in place for disbursement of these funds. Each Regional PD Committee guidelines and forms can be found in that region's Member Area page on the NWTTA website (login required). Applications for this funding are received and approved by your Regional Professional Development Committee. Please contact your LRO or Regional Professional Development Committee for more information.

#### **GNWT Central PD Funds**

GNWT NWTTA Members can also access funds through the Central Professional Development Fund.

You must apply and receive confirmation of approval BEFORE the start of the course to be eligible for reimbursement.

You are eligible to receive up to \$4,000 in tuition reimbursement this fiscal year (September 1 -August 31). Applications must meet the following requirements:

- Coursework must be related to professional development (work-related skills and knowledge) or growth (advancing role within the institution), or part of a college degree program
- Reimbursement is for tuition and mandatory student charges only (meals, mileage, and related expenses are not included)

- Courses must be taken at an accredited institution
  - Colleges & Institutes Canada
  - **Universities Canada**

GNWT Central PD funding is available for reimbursement of the following PD activities:

- **Online Distance Credit Courses**
- **Summer Credit Courses**
- **Summer Non-Credit Courses**
- **Educational Leadership Program Funding**
- **Education Leave with and without allowances**
- Indigenous Language Acquisition Funding

## **PD Spotlight**

## **Indigenous Language Acquisition Funding**

These funds are specifically for the purpose of professional improvement of language proficiency in one or more of the official Indigenous Languages of the Northwest Territories. GNWT NWTTA members are eligible to receive funds for:

1. Language Acquisition and Instruction Courses Purpose: For GNWT NWTTA teachers to take courses aimed at improving Indigenous Language Instruction.

Eligible Expenses: tuition, on-site accommodation and per diems, travel costs and substitute costs to a maximum of \$6000

2. Individual Language Learning Activities

Purpose: Available to GNWT NWTTA Indigenous Language teachers to improve their Indigenous language skills. Activities with Elders or other Indigenous language speakers where there is the opportunity to hear and speak language, learn more about language, traditional ways and beliefs are eligible for this funding. This funding could also be used to connect Indigenous Language teachers with a language mentor in the classroom.

Eligible Expenses: honoraria to Elder/language mentor, substitute costs where applicable and/or warranted, materials to a maximum of \$6000.

## Working for Our Members A Glimpse of What We Do

When the last school year ended in June, I was optimistic that the new school year would return to normal routines for educators, students and parents. So far, this optimism is holding and things appear to be back to the way things were before COVID-19 closed schools and played havoc with our lives including the education of children.

Students who are starting their school year in grade 2 are in their first year of school not wearing a mask, using hand sanitizer and sitting facing forward while trying to distance from other students. No more arrows to follow as they walk, all students going to recess at the same time, pizza days coming back and maybe a hug or two and a few high fives. When you think of it and try to view this new school year through the eyes of a current grade 2 student, things must look very different. Hopefully things keep getting better!

At NWTTA Central Office we too are looking at the new school year in a different way. This year our travel restrictions have lifted and we can travel to schools to meet with members and carry out the business of the Association. President Miller and I have attended regional teacher in-services at the beginning of the school year in several regions. We met with teachers in the Tlicho, Dehcho, Beaufort-Delta, and the new educators at Yellowknife Education District No. 1 (YK1).

At each of these in-services, teachers appeared very eager to setup their classrooms, get started with the new year, meet their students in-person and not let the last years of COVID-19 dampen their spirits. From the meetings we had with teachers at the beginning of the year, our students appear to be in good capable hands. One teacher we met in the Beaufort-Delta just graduated from university and is starting her first year of teaching. While driving from her home province to Inuvik she got a flat tire on the Dempster Highway. She changed the tire by putting on the small spare tire and carried on her journey. She is looking forward to the new school year in her NWT community, enjoying teaching her students and experiencing her first winter in the NWT.

Visiting schools provided us an opportunity to reexperience things that we could only think about as we reminisce. For example, when we visited the Tlicho school, Chief Jimmy Bruneau, this year we were invited to stay for lunch. It was great to see teachers and staff lined up to serve themselves from the serving trays and containers that contained the buffet meal that was prepared for them.

At Mildred Hall School (YK1 region), we met with new members to the district. My excitement in meeting the new YK1 teachers and Education Assistants surely did not go unnoticed. As I was walking from the back of the room to the front to speak to the new staff, I tripped in a dip in the floor causing me to fall. I immediately got up and after I did, I could sense that everyone who saw me fall were worried about me. I assured them I was okay and things went off without a hitch. Although I didn't like falling, meeting with the new staff was very much worth it. We were able to answer many questions they had and provide us an opportunity to build relationships that otherwise would not have occurred, especially during the last two years on Zoom meetings.

In the Dehcho, we met with teachers at an evening barbecue. This was a great time and as in the other schools we visited, the eagerness of the staff looking forward to the new school year was evident. There are new principals in several schools, new teachers, teachers who had left but this year are returning and of course many veteran teachers returning after teaching in the Dehcho for many years.

President Miller and I are currently holding the regional orientations with Regional Executives and LROs, and will continue to the end of September. Once all are completed Regional Executive members and Local Receiving Officers will have a better understanding on their roles within the NWTTA. As well we will receive input from participants that provide the direction the Association will take in a number of areas. This input from the regional orientations will be brought to the Regional Presidents and Central Executive at the Executive Leadership and Planning Meeting to be held in October for their discussion and help provide the goals of the Association for the year.

While I am optimistic that things are returning to normal, I would like to remind you that we must still remain diligent and continue to observe safety practices such as hand washing and wearing a mask if you feel safer in doing so. I hope you have a great year and I look forward to meeting you in-person at the NWT Educators' Conference and Women's Symposium in October.

In closing, please remember, if you do encounter any bumps along the way please contact us and we will try our best to level them for you so your journey is more pleasant.



The use of technology has increased dramatically in recent years, but the standards of professionalism have not changed. Teachers are professionals and expected to model ethical and appropriate cyberconduct. Teachers hold a position of trust with students and will be held accountable if their actions expose students to inappropriate material or communications. Remember, nothing is truly private when you communicate digitally. When you use school board equipment and networks, your employer has access to all your messages and any sites you have browsed.

#### WHEN PRIVATE BECOMES PUBLIC

Nothing posted is ever completely erased from the Internet. Anything can generate unintended consequences far into the future. "Friending" students, posting pictures of partying, or sending overly casual messages or texts to students, parents and others may lead to professional difficulties you did not anticipate. People tend to feel safe when surrounded by "friends". While sitting alone in front of a monitor, it is easy to forget that you are on a public forum. Consequently, the line between our public and private lives becomes blurred, making it easy to mistake a webpage for a diary.

#### **DO'S AND DON'TS OF USING EMAIL**

- Do maintain exemplary professional standards when sending email messages to students, parents, colleagues and administrators.
- Don't use your personal email accounts to contact students or parents.
- Do keep copies of all your email messages.
- Don't share your user name and password with colleagues or students.
- Do use a teacher voice when communicating with students via email.
- Don't leave your computer on and unattended when students are around.
- Do use a signature that includes your name, assignment title and school name.
- Don't send unnecessary attachments with your emails.

## Take Notice of your **Pay and Benefits**

Central Office frequently receives questions and concerns from members about their pay and benefits. We advise members to review their pay stubs and ensure enrollment in their Health and Dental Benefits

Confirm that you are correctly placed on the salary grid for your bargaining unit (Step and Category); if applicable, ensure you are receiving proper allowances.

A significant part of your compensation is the Health and Dental Benefits that you are entitled to. All three bargaining units have similar health and dental benefits, but they are not exactly the same nor provided by the same insurance companies.

It is important to understand your own benefits and best to contact your employer's Human Resources Department for enrollment information, documentation and the plans available to you if you have not been provided with this information as of

## **Government of the Northwest Territories** (GNWT)

Teachers employed by the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) are provided Health and Dental Benefits by two different providers. The Public Service Health Care Plan provides health benefits, and members are insured by Sun Life Assurance. Dental Benefits are provided through Green Shield Canada.

For new GNWT members, you will be eligible for Dental coverage on the first day following 3 months of continuous active employment. Your

green shield canada

dependent coverage will begin on the same date as your coverage.

Please note that after your Public Service Health Care Plan application is submitted to your Benefits Officer, new plan members



website before any claims are processed and receive a benefit card from Sun Life. If you apply for coverage:

- Within 60 days of eligibility, coverage will take effect the 1st of the month following Human Resources receipt of your application in their office.
- After your initial 60 days of eligibility, coverage will take effect the 1st of the 4th month following our receipt of your application in our office.

**GNWT: Benefits Summary of GNWT NWTTA Pamphlet** 

Yellowknife Catholic Schools teachers (YCS) and Yellowknife Education District No. 1 (YK1) members are covered by Manulife Insurance. Though Manulife covers both, the benefits are not exactly the same for each bargaining group.

## **Manulife Financial**

## Yellowknife Catholic Schools (YCS)

Benefits include Life Insurance, Accidental Death and Dismemberment, Extended Health Care, Dental Care and Long-Term Disability.

In addition to Group Benefits, teachers are eligible for a Health Spending Account of up to \$500 per school year for any health-related expenses for the teacher and their dependents. Any unused amounts in a teacher's Health Spending Account can be carried forward for one school year. Any amounts in a teacher's Health Spending Account that are not used within two (2) School Years shall lapse.

YCS: Benefits Summary of YCS NWTTA Pamphlet

## Yellowknife Education District No. 1 (YK1)

Benefits include Life Insurance, Accidental Death and Dismemberment, Extended Health Care, Dental Care and Long-Term Disability.

In addition to Group Benefits, YK1 members have

access to a Health Spending Account of up to \$800 per school year. Any unused amounts in a teacher's Health Spending Account can be carried forward for one school year, and within two (2) school years, the funds shall lapse.

Note: You must exhaust your Healthcare coverage under your Extended Care Plan and Dental Plan before you can access the Health Care Spending Account for the service used.

#### YK1: Benefits Summary of YK1 NWTTA **Pamphlet**

All NWTTA members: Remember to check your Collective Agreements for other benefits unique to each bargaining group, benefits such as:

- Maternity and Parental Leave
- Medical travel
- Professional Development
- Northern Allowance
- Removal Benefits
- Sick, Special, and other leaves
- Early Resignation bonuses
- Various Allowances (travel, admin, language...)

Not all of the collective agreements have the same benefits, so please check your agreement for information.

### Q. Where did you grow up?



Q. Where did you grow

I grew up in a small community called Parkdale on the South Shore of Nova Scotia.



#### Q. What made you decide to become a teacher?

Though I had many positive experiences during my own schooling, my reasons for becoming a teacher actually stem from negative experiences I had. My goal with teaching is to ensure that a lot of these negative experiences that I had will never happen to students in my own classroom.

#### Q. What do you teach?

I can teach Science, Math and Social Studies.

## Q. What do you enjoy most about teaching?

Without a doubt the thing I enjoy most about teaching is watching students find a passion for Math and Science where there may not have been one before.

#### Q. How do you engage your students?

I use a lot of gamification in my teaching. In my experience, playing games related to what is being taught is not only a great review tool, but allows students to learn concepts without realizing they're learning.

#### Feeling Valued

Throughout junior high and high school, I was far from the perfect student. Things I was dealing with at home followed me to school and severely affected my academics. I was having trouble learning a concept in Chemistry class, and even after getting extra help I was still struggling to understand it. My teacher went home that night and researched different methods I could use to answer that type of question, and brought them to me the next day. How valued and important I felt in that moment is how I aspire for my own students to feel.



## What I did this summer...

## **Education Leadership Program (ELP)**

Between July 1 and July 11, 2022, a group of NWTTA members participated in the Educational Leadership Program (ELP) in Yellowknife and surrounding area. ELP is a two-phase program that is designed to help participants develop their leadership skills for use in northern educational settings. All school principals in Northwest Territories schools must complete this program to be eligible for Principal's Certification. The program is also open to educators with two or more years of NWT teaching experience who are not currently school principals. ELP is a two-phase program with NWT principals required to participate in both phases. ELP was cancelled during 2020 and 2021 due to COVID-19.



## Remembering **Betty Wilcox**

Betty Wilcox (retired École Sir John Franklin High School, YK1 region) of Stanhope, PEI passed away peacefully on Thursday, July 7, 2022 at Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Charlottetown after a long battle trying to recover from a massive heart attack, she had suffered in early May that had left her with only 20 percent heart function. She had just turned 72 on June 24 and had hoped for many more creative and fruitful years on her adopted island home.

Predeceased by her parents, Johannes and Jantina Mensink, she is survived by her husband, John Wilcox, sister, Maryke Mareti, brother, John Mensink, partner Catherine Ostell and their daughter, Jessica Mensink. Betty was an aunt to John's sister, Cathy's children, David and Laura, and a great aunt with the births of Henry by Laura and later Mavis by David's wife, Kandas. She leaves behind numerous cousins, both here and in the Netherlands and Betty made innumerable friends as she journeyed through her life.

Born in the Netherlands in the aftermath of WW2, Betty along with her parents and sister arrived in Ontario, Canada and over time adapted to a different way of life. She spent her adolescent years and young adulthood in Kitchener-Waterloo where she met her future husband, John. They married in July of 1971.

After John's college graduation, the couple moved to Victoria on Vancouver Island and settled in for a 14 year stay. The University of Victoria proved to be exactly right for Betty. She blossomed and in 1984 she received Bachelor of Arts degrees in both History and Art History. She received her Bachelor of Education degree in 1989.

Economics precipitated a move back to Ontario shortly thereafter but after two years there and dealing with another economic downturn, Betty managed to land a teaching job in Yellowknife, NWT and off they went. This move allowed Betty to thrive in all aspects of her very

visual world and she threw herself into every challenge and thrived: Teaching, Painting, Illustrating, Murals on buildings, Murals in the school, decorated garbage bins, Fibreglass Ravens, Talent shows, Art shows, Department head for fine arts, many awards and too many more projects to list. These were vibrant years for Betty.

In 2010 she and her husband moved to Stanhope, PEI and their new-built home. These years on PEI were filled with activity and a determination to enjoy a fulfilling retirement. Despite being hampered by a tremor from her Parkinson's disease, she was still able to produce some wonderful artwork, share her skills with others, took art classes and had become part of PEI's art community.

Betty was a visual artist, she was a teacher, she was kind, she had a big heart, she wanted to see fairness prevail, she loved animals, she was one of the nicest and most thoughtful people you could ever ask to meet. She is missed.



This experience led to lots of learning, sharing of ideas and was transformative for everyone. Spending time with Elders in spiritual places really does contribute to developing great educators in the north.











## Remembering **Eugène Roach**

**Eugène Donald Roach** (December 5, 1976 - July 25, 2022) (École St. Joseph School, YCS region) passed away peacefully; nearly four years after receiving a diagnosis for stage 4 metastasized lung cancer.

Eugène was born in St John, New Brunswick in 1976 to Linda Roach. During his formative years he was surrounded by the love and strength of his "extra" family Sylvain and Mildred Vautour and their children, who treated Eugène like instant family and often refer to him as their little brother. Soon after,

Linda met Isidore and he joined the family, being Eugène's role model, father and friend.

Raised in the Acadian village of St Louis de Kent, he helped out his uncles in the summer on their lobster fishing boats. From a young age, Eugène was obsessed with sports. Thanks to his godfather and grandfather he acquired a love for hockey and baseball and would spend hours outside playing catch. Upon graduation from the Université de Moncton, Eugène traveled north to Mayo, Yukon to start his teaching career. many special students crossed his path, and he strived to ensure they learned valuable life lessons through sports.

Through their marriage, Eugène became a father to Courtney and took this role very seriously. As a family they could be found traveling during school holidays (as long as the trips revolved around food, sports, Acadian culture or music), or planning their next Northern adventure over a board game at the kitchen table.

As the winters were long in the North, Eugène had many hobbies, one of which was music. Many music parties were hosted in the Roach house, with friendships formed through the strum of a guitar. Thanks to the support of the music scene in Yellowknife, Eugène fulfilled a lifelong dream of recording two albums with other talented musicians, allowing the world a glimpse into the depths of this quiet man.

Eugène liked to spend as much time outside as possible, whether that be hunting, or on the water in his boat. Great

Slave Lake was his sanctuary and exploring it with Cynthia and Courtney became a summertime ritual. Many shore lunches and camping trips were shared, and Burnt Island Man Spas always held a special place in his heart.

As a coach, player, organizer and occasional cheerleader, Eugène became involved in all aspects of the sporting community in Yellowknife. His passion for hockey led him to be a proud member of the WIMP Hockey Organization and he was known by his teammates for a great 'floppy fish' save.

As Eugène's disease progressed, he left the North with Cynthia and headed to Vancouver Island. The lure of year round fishing, easier climates, and their daughter and son-in-law down the road, made Sooke, British Columbia the perfect spot to be.

Eugène lived each day to the fullest, despite his diagnosis, and ignored any suggested time lines or statistics. He lived life large, but focused on the small things, drawing some of his strength from a special student who shared this understanding deeply. Seeking joy daily, he reminded us all that he, not the cancer, was in control.

Eugène leaves behind to cherish his memory his loving wife Cynthia, his daughter Courtney, son-in-law Lionel, parents Linda and Isidore, parents-in-law Donna and Ray, step-brothers Eric (Trina) and Robert, step-sister Micheline (Simon), brother-in-law Scott, nieces Alaria (Massimo) and

Mara, nephew Spencer, godparents Lucille and Marven, his beloved Bear and many many special friends, aunts, uncles, cousins and students too numerous to name.

Eugène was predeceased by his special little buddy Jonas, Grandmothers Mildred, Jeaninne, and Aurore, Grandfathers Sylvan, Eloi and Oscar, and sister-in-law Janet.

Eugène's family gives thanks to the amazing medical team that spanned from Yellowknife to Edmonton to Victoria. They left no stone unturned, listened to his wishes, believed in his strength, and supported him along his journey.

#### **Teaching Begins with Connections**




